Textbook: Adventures in Japanese I

Course Description: Japanese I introduces basic communication skills in Japanese, focusing on fluency (listening and speaking) as well as Hiragana letters, which are fundamental to comprehend Japanese. The class also practices writing sentences and reading. In addition, 36 Kanji letters, or Chinese characters, are expected to learn. During the course of the lesson, various aspects of the culture, heritage, and people of Japan will be also discussed.

Course Objectives

Students are expected to be able to:

- 1. Verbally communicate in Japanese to convey their messages;
- 2. Write about familiar subjects to communicate with readers;
- 3. Understand the main idea and some details of reading and listening materials;
- 4. Gain a deeper understanding of Japanese culture and people.

Retaking Tests

If you wish to retake any tests except for the final exams, you will be given <u>ONE</u> opportunity to retake a test that you didn't perform well. You will receive your grade with the highest grade being a 70. It is **YOUR RESPONSIBILITY** to notify the teacher your intention to retake a test. You must retake the test before the six-week grading period. If you encounter the situation where you need to retake a test, it is **STRONGLY RECOMMENDED** you participate in tutoring.

Make-Up Tests/Assignments

If you are absent for the testing day for any reasons, it is **YOUR RESPONSIBILITY** to remind the teacher that you need to retake the test. You must take a test within TWO days from your last absence day.

Late Work

Students will lose 30 points or 30% when you turn in the assignment one A or B day for a late, meaning they will receive a zero for work turned in after one day late. Be on time!

Homework

There won't be many homework assignments. You are expected to review for the day's lesson for 10 to 30 minutes and study for quizzes and tests. Especially, for those who plan to go up to AP Japanese 4, I strongly recommend that they be exposed to Japanese, including songs, movies, anime, etc. at least 30 minutes a day. If you are interested in anime, use SUB, instead of DUB to watch shows.

Posting Student Work

Students grades will be posted in Skyward parent portal within five business days for daily grades and major grades.

Class Participation

Active participation is critical to master Japanese and expected from all students. You will have a lot of opportunities to practice to speak though pair and group activities as well as the whole class practice and acting out. Take advantage of the class time to learn and improve your Japanese language skills. This class is a stress free classroom: don't be afraid of making mistakes. During some activities, you are required **to speak ONLY in Japanese.** In addition to it, Teacher will speak ONLY in Japanese during the class time, meaning you MUST be paying attention or you will NOT understand at all.

Extra Credits

You may earn extra credits by voluntarily participating in the class and creating materials for the class (Please see the teacher for details).

Attendance and Tardy Policy

Please remember one class period at Ben Barber is equivalent to three class periods class at your home campus. If you miss one day, you miss three days! You cannot afford this. All tardies and absences will be recorded and reported in accordance with MISD policy set forth in the Student Handbook (p. 60). <u>An absence is defined as missing 20 minutes or more of any class.</u>

PLEASE READ (IMPORTANT!)

Dear Parent(s),

I am excited to have your child in my Japanese class. Learning Japanese can be fun; however, please let me share with you information regarding the Japanese class.

First, the Japanese language is categorized as one of the most challenging languages for English native speakers to learn according to the Foreign Service Institute of the United States Department of State. The reasons are because English and Japanese are very different languages in their words, grammar, and writing forms.

Second, learning the Japanese writing forms can be especially challenging for some students because of the nature of this course. Japanese classes at Ben Barber are semester courses instead of year-long courses so the classes are taught at an accelerated pace. Therefore, students are expected to learn reading one of Japanese writing forms called Hiragana, which has 46 letters, in the first three weeks of the class, and writing Hiragana in the first six weeks of the class.

All students have a great potential to master reading and writing Hiragana letters although they have to learned in a short amount of time. Some students may have to spend more time to memorize the letters. As you know, if you do not read English, you will not survive in your English class. It is the same in the Japanese class. It is very critical that each student reads and writes in Japanese.

This message does NOT intend to discourage any students from taking the Japanese class. I would like all of my students to be successful in the class and enjoy learning the language. The purpose of this letter is for the student and parent to understand the nature of the Japanese language, the setting of the course, and the challenges this course might bring if time is not spent learning the letters and writing in the first six weeks of the course. If your student needs additional help, please encourage him/her to attend tutoring on Tuesdays from 2:30 to 3:30.

Summary:

- ✓ Everyone has a potential to learn Japanese.
- ✓ The Japanese language is one of most challenging languages to master.
- ✓ Japanese has different writing forms (3 forms), grammar, words, etc. from English.
- ✓ The course is a semester course, meaning the class goes very fast.
- ✓ Students are expected to master to read Hiragana in 3 weeks & write Hiragana in 6 weeks.
